Programming: Moon On The Man

Inducted into the Country Radio Hall of Fame in 2009, Moon Mullins retired Wednesday (6/18) after an unparalleled 53-year career that included being group PD for Journal, consulting with Pollack Media and founding a research company. Looking back on programming some of the biggest Country stations ever, he shares his favorite moments and what he would have done if he'd known Facebook was coming. Interestingly, Mullins says his greatest professional accomplishment had nothing to do with radio.

CA: You programmed some legendary stations. Does one stand out?

MM: WDAF/Kansas City, when it was AM, was just a monster powerhouse. WHN/New York, WSM/Nashville and KVOO/Tulsa were all meaningful call letters to me as I was coming up in the business.



But the hallmark of my career came when I was in Louisville, where I spent nine years reading talking books for the blind. They were audio books, just like you'd buy these days, only they were provided free to sightless people. It wasn't radio, but it allowed so much creativity and was a tremendous education: reading books and periodicals; learning how to pronounce words; learning new words, what they meant and how to use them; foreign languages, learning how to

mimic them – it was like going to school, only they paid me. I recently bought the first set of talking books I recorded back in 1969 through eBay. They're 16 RPMs and there's no way to play them, but I now own them. (continued on page 11)

Mabe's Presidential Appointment

Newly minted Universal Music Group/Nashville President Cindy Mabe (Breaking News 6/12) discusses her role and her approach to it.

CA: How long has this promotion been in the works and how did you find out it was happening?


CM: I'm not sure how long it's been in the works, but I just found out about it last week.


How is your role changing? Are you working with some departments in ways you hadn't previously - A&R or promotion, for instance?

I will continue to run marketing for Universal, but now all other departments will















report to me and [Chairman/CEO] Mike Dungan. My job is to keep us all in sync with day-to-day planning and strategy but ultimately, we will start building the infrastructure for what the music business will look like over the next few years. As people consume music differently, we are trying to look ahead and plan for how we keep music important no matter how it's consumed. Car companies, smart phones, and new technology are changing the way we listen to, discover and consume music. We want to strategically build the groundwork for a consumer shift while keeping us totally in sync with continuing to break artists every day.

Does being a woman and the president of a label group have deeper meaning for you when, historically, there have been so few women in that role?

My mom always told me I could do anything I put my mind to. I was the first and only girl baseball player on my team at six years old. I've never had the mentality that there are specific jobs for men and some for women; I just want to be good at what I do. I am very proud to represent women, but I would never want to be given an opportunity just because I am a woman. I want to help lead the next phase of the music industry.

How has the 2012 merger of Capitol/EMI and UMG reshaped the culture from what you knew with Capitol?

The last 18 months have been a growing experience. We went from the smallest [major label] in staff and number of artists to the largest. It wasn't seamless or easy, and we've made adjustments along the way, which we will continue to do. It has taken a while to develop, but 18 months later, we have a rhythm. We've all had to learn to trust each other, not make decisions in a vacuum, be more flexible and learn to play to our strengths. There is power in our size, our collective opinions and experiences. There is really a wealth of knowledge and resources that neither company had prior to the merger. Change is always hard, but I'm really proud of where we stand together today and I'm excited for our future.

Can you point to a defining moment or story that explains who you are and how you approach your work?

One of the most defining things we've done collectively this past year has been the George Strait "Entertainer of a Lifetime" campaign. I went to one of the early shows on *The Cowboy Rides* Away Tour and you could see the emotion in George's eyes. The crowds sang his songs back to him louder than he could sing them. I just had a lump in my throat and it motivated me to make sure people recognized how much this man has done and means to

country music. I wanted to make people feel the emotion and react.

So I tasked my marketing staff 18 months ago to help me build a campaign with the idea that if the cowboy was going to ride away, it would be in hero fashion that fans, artists and industry could all celebrate. Our marketing team became a task force and we strategized weekly to push the idea, find opportunities and just keep building them into a massive snowball The promotion team joined in with the plan for the 60th No. 1 song. We built fan-trackers online and changed it from a campaign to a full on movement. Artists, celebrities, politicians, fans and radio stations joined in. We followed the single with George's 25th No. 1 album and an overall new sales branding campaign.

But our ultimate goal was to get George back into the Entertainer of the Year categories. We changed our slant to Entertainer of a Lifetime. The emphasis was really that George's music was the soundtrack of our lives. Our A&R team got involved and helped us garner George's time and involvement. Ultimately, the campaign touched every department in the building as well as George's team. It took hours of brain power and strategy, but it will go down as one of the most effective campaigns we've executed. On our best days, that's what we can do as a team. Teamwork is everything.

That's Luke's Heinz Of Night

and more than 50,000 fans helped set the all-time Heinz Field country attendance record in Pittsburgh Saturday (6/21), according to Bryan's publicist. The fact that it was the headliner's very first stadium show made it all the sweeter. **Country Aircheck** caught up with WOGI/Pittsburgh's **Dave Anthony** and WDSY/ Pittsburgh's **Mark Anderson** and **Stoney Richards** for some other things that made the show special — and not so special.

"Usually on shows like this the opening artists end up working a smaller area near the front of a larger stage and not the whole thing," notes Anthony. "One thing that was unique about this show was that everyone got to use the whole thing." And that's saying



something. Parts of the stage extended almost to mid-field. "I'd never seen that kind of configuration before," Anthony continues. "Even people in the middle of the house had a front row seat."

That gave plenty of room for the

show's openers to strut their stuff. "Cole Swindell showed that he's ready to play a venue of that size," says Anderson. "And only Lee Brice could hold notes as long as he did. He filled every nook and cranny of that place!"

OFF THE RECORD: Jamie Lynn Spears

In2une's **Jamie Lynn Spears** gives an industry spin on the artist interview.

I'm from Kentwood, Louisiana, about an hour north of New Orleans, but I went to school in Mississippi. Since I had an older brother and sister, I didn't have a lot of choice in what I listened to. On the other hand, I love listening to everything because my family had very diverse tastes. Dad listened to country a lot, though, and being a daddy's girl, we really bonded over

country music. He loves Alan Jackson, so when I got to open for him, the first thing I did was cry and call my dad. I couldn't believe it.

The first time I heard myself on the radio I was on my first week of my first radio tour. I don't remember which station it was, but it was bizarre because it sounds so different when you hear it on the radio! I was in shock. They told me they were going to play it, but I didn't know they were going to do it as I was leaving the station.

When you perform acoustically in an intimate environment like a radio station, there's a lot of room for people to find flaws. I still get nervous. And the first time it was scary to walk in sort of blindly. But everyone has received me really well and they've all been really, really nice to me.

The hardest thing about being on the road during the radio tour is being away from my little girl and my husband. I miss them a lot, and not being able to crawl in bed with them every night is the thing that I struggle with most.

One of the things I always have with me on the road is tea. Hot, hot tea. With all the traveling and with my allergies being so bad, I've got to have it. I've got Throat Coat tea and green tea. Those are my favorites.


If I could have dinner with anyone, I would choose my grandmother. She was from England and died when I was really young. I've heard so many stories about her over the years and I've always wanted to be able to sit down and talk with her.

I've been working on The Journey for the past six years and it's the first time introducing myself as an adult artist. And these songs are all personal stories from a personal place. I hope people feel like they get to know me a lot better through them. I put my heart in it and I hope people can connect to in that way.

"Cole was like a kid in a candy store," adds Richards "He was just beside himself with amazement at playing Heinz Field where he once sold merchandise."

Not surprisingly, one of the biggest reactions of the night came as Bryan took the stage, rising from the floor and encircled in a ring of fire for "My Kind Of Night." And he localized well," notes Anderson. "He had a [Pittsburgh Steelers'] Terrible Towel in his back pocket and a Steelers cap. He handed out beers and even brought people down from the 500 level."

The crowd grew loud again as Bentley returned to the stage during Bryan's set with official word that the night had been a record-breaker. "That got a lot of reaction, obviously," says Anthony. The two also paired on more than a few throwback tunes, including George Strait's "Unwound" and Garth Brooks' "Much Too Young (To Feel This Damn Old)." Other highlights included Cole Swindell's return to the stage to deliver "This Is How We Roll" with Bryan, which the two co-wrote with Florida Georgia Line's Tyler Hubbard and Brian Kelley. More cheers and a few tears came when Bryan offered "Drink A Beer" to a picture backdrop of longtime Steelers head coach Chuck Noll, who passed away earlier this month.

Despite the new venue record and an abundance of happy country fans, much attention is being paid to the excess of trash and the handful of arrests surrounding the concert (local TV coverage here). "To me it just seemed like there weren't a lot of trash receptacles," says Anthony. "I walked around for 25 minutes with an empty coffee cup at one point looking for a garbage can. The city did make an effort, though, in that they gave people trash bags as they came into the parking lot. I just don't think it was enough." A similar situation followed last summer's Kenny Chesney concert at the venue. —Russ Penuell

The Place: Wiener Circle in Chicago The Appeal: "The staff is trained to berate you until you order, so know what you want when you show up," he says. "This is, however, what makes going to Wiener Circle so special. It's like watching some weird form of standup comedy

meets verbal assault meets culinary delight. Only place on earth you can have a hot dog and tell someone to fu*k off at the same time, and it's expected that you do so. Priceless! One of my buddies, who wears glasses, was standing there just starting at the menu board out front and the lady at the counter, in front of the large crowd waiting to order, says to him, 'What the hell you want Harry Potter?' The whole crowd

started cracking up. Also, for a really funny reaction, go late night, take a 20-dollar bill, slap it down on the counter and ask for a double chocolate milk shake. Let me know how that goes for ya."

Counterpoint: WUSN/Chicago's Marci Braun has other ideas. "Yes, Wiener Circle is a great place to get yelled at while you're eating at 3:30am. But unless you're out with a bunch of drunk

dudes, it's not really a place that girls go to a bunch. If I wanna get yelled at while eating, I'll go to Sunday brunch with my family. However, I will say that Triumph the Insult Comic Dog visiting The Wiener Circle might be the best thing to ever happen (watch here). As for me, gotta say I have two favorites. Want a great steak? Chicago Cut Steakhouse. Beyond delicious. I may or may not have eaten a 35 oz. Prime Rib there once ... ok, twice. Great sushi? Get out of downtown and head north. Rise Sushi on Southport is my jam. They have a Flaming Maki which is to die for. And yes, there is fire involved when they put it on your table, so proceed with caution."







Saturday, the tour stopped in Dallas. Cumulus KSCS & KPLX/Dallas OM J.R. Schumann didn't feel there was a lot of production, but notes that Shelton didn't need it. "Blake has a way to make you feel like you're at a huge party and yet feel like you're the only person in the room at the same time," he says. "His command of the stage and audience is truly remarkable. I would have zero hesitation in voting for Blake as a nominee for Entertainer of the Year." Miranda Lambert was a surprise guest Saturday, performing "Baggage Claim" and leading the soldout crowd in "Happy Birthday" for her husband, who turned 38 Wednesday (6/18).

One other thing: when I took my mother backstage at the Grand Ole Opry in 1988, she told me it was the greatest moment of her life. And I thought, "Boy did that make up for all the shit I gave her when I was a kid."

What got you into radio?

When I was growing up, my brother used to play radio with a wire recorder and I just wanted to emulate him so I started doing the same kind of thing. I had my own station with call letters and different disc jockeys and commercials. After enough of that, I wanted to do the real thing so I actually dropped out of school in '61 and got a job in a little town not too far from Lubbock, my home town. It all started at KKAL/Denver City, TX, long gone from the scene now.



What are your favorite memories of working with artists?

In 1999, Brad Paisley was performing at the KFDI/Wichita Anniversary Party. Janie Frickie was the headliner and Brad, who was just starting out, played for about 20 people. We sat on the bus afterward with Brad and Johnny Western, who was a disc jockey at KFDI and is also a member of the Country Radio Hall of Fame. They both played guitar and sang a couple of songs together. I asked if they could play "El Paso" and I remember Brad playing it just like Grady Martin. It was great.

Bill Anderson was the first country music artist I ever met. He was always nice and over the years has remained just the way he was when I first met him. When I first saw Johnny Cash he was high on pills or something. And June Carter – later portrayed by Reese Witherspoon, who got her to a "T" – was just a great personality that I was kind of blown away by. She was just such a firecracker.



Any regrets?

I was the first to play Cash's "Folsom Prison Blues" and I got a gold record for breaking the song because the label had been pushing the other side, called "The Folk Singer." It was early on, and I put that on at KCKN/Kansas City and it just took off right away. My brother remembers going to Nashville with me and my first wife, where Johnny and June presented the plaque. I actually don't remember it and there are no pictures. I was never one for "Hey, take my picture with this artist." Looking back, I sure wish I had kept more pictures. I would have if I'd known Facebook was coming.

To what do you credit your longevity?

I couldn't do anything else; they just kept me around. I did try to retire back before the recession and that wiped out my little nest egg and it took several years to recover. Once I determined that I couldn't retire, I stayed here at WBKR. Then, when it came time again, I gave long enough notice because I wanted this be the place where I stayed the longest. It's about a month less than nine years here, and I was about two months short of nine years in Louisville.

What will you do with yourself?

I'll take some time off and I want to go see some of my relatives. I'll go to family reunions, see some Astros games because I know I can get good seats and then I'll find something to do. If someone will have me it will be something to do with Country radio.


